



"OLD PUEBLO" TUCSON CITY TOUR

A visit to the Arizona Historical Museum, Old Town Artisans and a trip to "A" Mountain with lunch at a southwestern restaurant to be announced.

The Arizona Historical Museum exhibits depict state history from Spanish times to the present and include costumes, an Arizona mining hall complete with mine shaft, and a collection of 19th century glass. An extensive research library contains collections on Western history, manuscripts, photographs and maps.

Old Town Artisans is a restored 1860's adobe in historic El Presidio. A 13-room marketplace featuring Arizonan handcrafted work, Indian and Latin American folk art.

"A" Mountain, to the west of Tucson, was a lookout point for the valley's early inhabitants. Indians watched for flash floods and approaching enemies; the Spaniards used it to provide warning of Apache raids. Today, University of Arizona freshmen annually whitewash the "A".



GENERAL INFORMATION

You may fly into the Tucson International Airport. If you choose to have a rental car, it is a pleasant 24 mile (30 minute) drive to the El Conquistador. Arizona Stagecoach shuttle is located curbside, outside the airport entrance, at a cost of \$16.00 one way/per person. Arizona Stagecoach shuttle is a continuous service.

Weather in Tucson will averages 93 degrees for a high and 67 degrees low for our September meeting.

You won't have any problem finding anything to do, the problem may be finding time to do them in the resort area. At the Sheraton Tucson El Conquistador Golf and Tennis Resort, recreational facilities consist of 45 holes of championship golf, 31 lighted tennis courts, racquetball, riding stables, four outdoor swimming pools and two complete fitness centers. For your dining pleasure, the hotel has five restaurants with a wide variety of cuisines.

POINTS OF INTEREST



Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum - "living" museum with over 300 plants and 200 animals is rated one of the top zoos in the country.

Mission San Xavier del Bac - is seen for miles, often called "the White Dove of the Desert". The mission was established in 1629 and is still the mission for the Papago Indians. Mass is still celebrated every day.

Old Tucson Studios - experience the new magic of the Old West. A world-famous Western theme park and movie set includes frontier sets, adobe buildings housing shops, restaurants and museums. Be witness to live gunfights, stunt demonstrations, saloon revues and stagecoach rides.

Titan II Missile Museum - is the world's only ballistic missile museum. Get a close-up look at the Launch Control Center, and a briefing on the Titan program. Located next to the Pima Air Museum; is the largest privately funded air museum in the world.

Biosphere II - a two-year pilot program of establishing a prototype for space colonization and exploring better environmental management. Tours are given everyday of the year.



SHOPPING

Plan at least one day for shopping. The Tucson area is a shopper's paradise, offering everything from antiques and southwest articles to modern-day bargains at local shops.

Many shops offer southwest items to take home a momento of your trip to Tucson. Over 50 shops featuring southwestern arts, crafts, gifts, and jewelry are waiting for you in Tucson.

The Tucson Mall and Foothills Mall are just a shuttle ride away for your shopping pleasure.
